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1. Working as a Veterinarian, NOC 3114

Job Description

Veterinarians prevent, diagnose and treat diseases and disorders in animals. You also advise clients on the general care of animals. You may specialize in the care and treatment of either small or large animals.

As a **Veterinarian** you perform some or all of the following duties:

- Examine animals and diagnose problems or diseases
- Treat sick or injured animals
- Vaccinate animals to prevent diseases and illnesses
- Provide obstetrical and dental services
- Provide advice about animal care to owners
- May be responsible for overall operation of animal hospital or clinic
- May conduct veterinary research
- May enforce government regulations in disease control and food production

Industry Overview

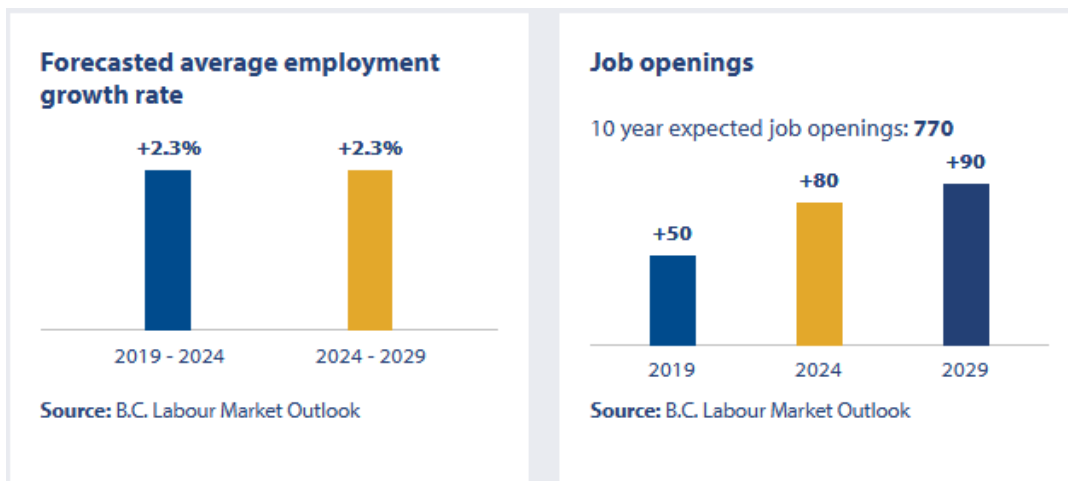
A 2019 study by the BC Chapter of the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association revealed a serious shortage of veterinarians in BC.

Growth for veterinarians has been driven by pet owners spending more on animal care and technological and medical advancements enabling better care for animals. Employment opportunities are also available for those willing to handle large animals or work in rural and isolated areas.

Many veterinarians work as employees for several years before forming partnerships or starting new practices. The cost of setting up a new business in veterinary medicine can be as high as \$500,000.

Veterinarians also provide expertise in the area of disease outbreak identification and control. You may help to ensure food safety for humans during food production from animal sources.

Job Outlook in BC



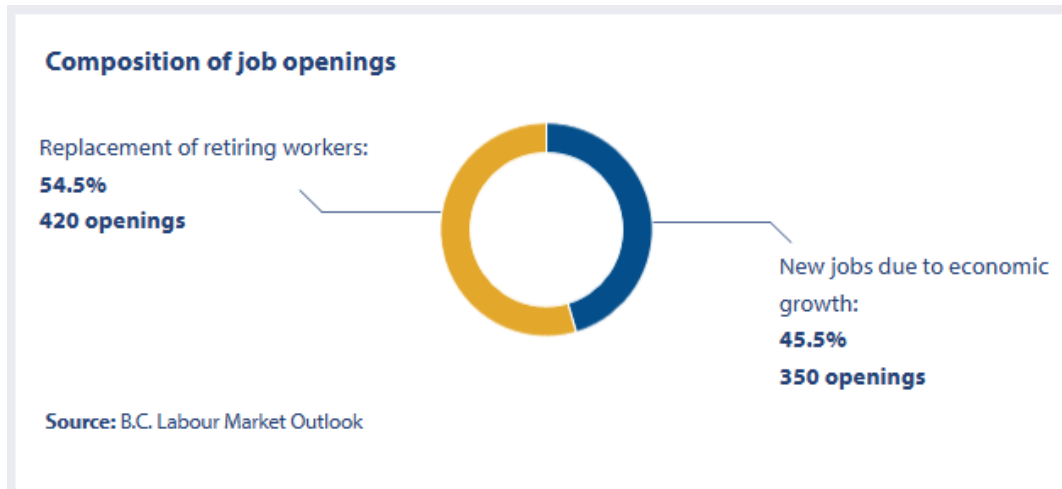

Types of Employers

The majority of veterinarians work in private practices. You may also work for the government or private industry in areas such as animal disease research, zoo consultation, or meat and milk inspection (at packing plants and dairies). Some teach in veterinary schools.

Salary

The median annual salary for veterinarians working full-time in BC is \$85,140. Vets can earn between \$35,000 and \$144,000 a year. If you own a successful private practice, you may earn more. Veterinary surgeons and researchers typically earn the highest salaries.

In addition to a salary, most full-time veterinarians receive health and dental benefits, paid sick days, and paid vacations. If you are self-employed, you must provide your own benefits.

Working Hours

You generally work 8 to 10 hours a day, up to approximately 50 to 60 hours a week. You may work nights and weekends to accommodate the schedules of pet owners.

It is common for a large animal veterinarian to be called out to a farm for an emergency in the middle of the night.

2. Skills, Education and Experience

Skills

- Strong written and oral communication skills
- Work well with others in a team environment
- Good with people
- Problem solving
- Observant
- Decisive
- Hard-working

Education and Experience

In order to work as a veterinarian you require:

- two years of pre-veterinary university studies or completion of a college program in health science

AND

- a four to five year university degree in veterinary medicine
- completion of national certification exams
- a provincial license to practice

Entry into research positions may require post-graduate study

Qualifications

This occupation is regulated in British Columbia.

You must be registered with the College of Veterinarians of British Columbia (CVBC) to work as a veterinarian.

If you wish to be registered with the CVBC, you must:

- complete a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (DVM) degree or equivalent from an institution recognized by the Canadian Veterinary Medicine Association;
- successfully complete the National Examining Board (NEB) examinations and receive a Certificate of Qualification;
- complete the practical training required as part of the program of study;
- be legally entitled to work in Canada;
- demonstrate to the College that you are of suitable character and conduct

Internationally Trained Veterinarians

If you are qualified as a veterinarian in another country you must satisfy all the above listed requirements. You must also have a Certificate of Qualifications from the National Examining Board (NEB) **before** you are eligible to apply for registration by the BCVMA. If you completed your veterinary education at an acceptable (recognized but not accredited by the American Veterinary Medical Association) veterinary school where instruction was not provided in English, you must also demonstrate proficiency in the English language.

Click on "Start Search" beside Canadian Businesses, then select the "Advanced Search" button. Select both "Keyword/SIC/NAICS" under Business Type and "City" under Geography. In the top search box enter "veterinary" and click SEARCH. Select the appropriate headings. Lower down, select the Province, choose the cities, and click the "View Results" button.

4. Applying for a Job

In Canada, employers usually expect to receive a resume or curriculum vitae and a cover letter. These should identify the position you are applying for and summarize your relevant experience.
